Agenda Item: Combating Malnutrition Among Children in Underserved

Bangladesh has a high number of children aged 0-14 compared to most countries. For this reason, the extreme weakness and shortness rate due to malnutrition is high. For a better nutrition and a productive education at school, Bangladesh launched a new school milk program in 2023. Another reason for this is the last place in the world from Bangladesh's per capita milk production. Since it was approximately 75ml less than the recommended daily consumer, it was necessary to start such a program.

The problems caused by this and many malnutrition continue to increase and spread rapidly in the world. It is just one of these problems in insufficient water resources. Reaching clean and hygienic water has been a difficult resource for many people to reach. Countries that are more economically and environmentally poor and developing are experiencing such problems. Diseases that significantly affect the lives of children such as obesity and extreme weakness are as important as not being able to reach clean water. Unfortunately, we see that these diseases are increasing day by day. Since women who cannot be adequately fed during pregnancy cannot provide adequate nutrition to their children, problems can be seen in their health or appear over time when the child in the womb is born.

It is our duty to solve these problems and more. We can check the health status of children and pregnant women free of charge every month. After the baby is born, their food and drink needs can be met until a certain time. These resources can be distributed every 3 days to ensure that all the public reaches the clean water source. In schools, at least one balanced meal should be given free of charge.

Bangladesh believes that if these problems and solutions are discussed and put into practice, a better world will be prepared for both adults and children.
