Agenda Item: A Legal Framework Concerning The Protection Of Prisoners Of War During War

Times And Its Safe Conduct

Prisoners of war have always been a critical problem for all member states. It has been a huge issue since the American Civil War (1863). Governments that were led by Russia tried to terminate this circumstance with an assembly which was called First Hauge Convention back in 1899. It was considered as one of the first step into recognizing the term of Prisoners of War as well as the Geneva Convention. After these conventions governments had reunited in Hauge again back in 1907, caused by Russia-Japan wars. Via the Second Hauge Convention, undefended and civil regions were secured by the help of the articles. All the improvements were ratified by Geneva Conventions including the articles such providing medical needs for PoW's (Article 15-29-47), being able to live their beliefs freely (Article 34), treat PoWs in humane way (Article 13-14) etc.

Within the last wars such as the Palestine/Israel and Russia/Ukraine conflicts, war crimes have got increased and many like rights of PoW's became an important crisis. Our government acknowledges this important humanity issue. Back in 1963, the Kingdom Of Saudi Arabia ratified the Geneva Conventions as well as first and second protocols which represents our point of view on these topics.

In conclusion, the circumstances that were mentioned previously hold an essential role for the sake of humanity. To improve these standards we highly urge member states into cooperation and forming UN bodies. We also strongly recommend member states to establish a coalition bound to OHCHR and International Criminal Court working for detecting war crimes . Additionally ameliorating the life standards of PoW's and smoothing the way either for returning to their home towns or neutral countries.
