Today, millions of children have had to leave their homes because of war, danger, or violence. Around 48 million children are displaced, and about 19 million of them are refugees. Many refugee children cannot go to school because of language problems, missing documents, or not enough classrooms. Almost half of all refugee children worldwide are still out of school. India believes that every child deserves the right to learn, no matter where they come from.

Refugee children have many problems when they try to go to school. They may not speak the language, or there may not be enough classrooms. Some children also do not have documents. India believes that every child should have a chance to access education . India has welcomed many refugee groups, like people from Tibet, Sri Lanka, Afghanistan, and the Rohingya community. India works with global organizations and other international groups to help these children go to school, get supplies, and learn in safe places. India knows that countries must work together to give education to all refugee children.

Solutions and Conclusion

- 1- Make school registration easier for refugee children by reducing document requirements.
- 2- Provide language support classes for children who don't speak the local language.
- 3- Train teachers to understand and support refugee students in the classroom.
- 4- Work with UNICEF, and NGOs to build safe classrooms and provide books, supplies, and emotional support.
- 5- Offer digital learning tools or community learning centers for children who cannot attend school every day.
- 6- Promote kindness and acceptance in schools to prevent discrimination. Ensure that schools are safe places free from discrimination, violence or abuse.

India is committed to working with the international community to ensure that every refugee child receives the education they deserve. Through cooperation, innovation and empathy, the global community can give refugee children hope, stability, and a better future.
