We want to communicate more with the local people and keep the culture alive. We will support the youths protests, even if it puts us in a difficult position. This is such a great benefit for our nation. We are trying to minimize the damage done to the native culture as much as possible, but unfortunately it still continues. We want to increase consistency, equality and commitment across states so that laws and projects can be implemented correctly. One of our goals is to increase digital archives, particularly of Aboriginal culture, Australia's native people. We would also like to point out that we have not yet ratified the UNESCO convention. This is still a topic that is being discussed in the parliament. We are ready to do our best for our culture and well being.
