Honorable chairs distinguished delegates The Russian Federation acknowledges that child labor isn't acceptable and remains a global issue that limits millions of children from acquiring the basic necessities like education, security, health and avenues to explore and grow. While progress has been made through laws that have been put in place to help the situation, there's still much to be done. On a global scale particularly in regions facing poverty, conflict and limited access to education, it still remains a significant issue. We firmly believe that the international community should work together to ensure that every child has the opportunity for basic education and new technologies to excel in this changing times. The Russian Federation has established clear regulations regarding the permitted working hours and conditions for children. Under current policy, it prohibits the employment of minors under 16. For children aged 16 to 18, shifts may not exceed seven hours, with a maximum of 36 working hours per week. Individuals under the age of 18 are not permitted to work night shifts, perform hazardous tasks, or undertake any form of employment considered harmful to their moral development. Furthermore, Russia has implemented educational reforms, social welfare programs, and youth support initiatives aimed at reducing economic pressures that lead to early labour. While we acknowledge the challenges faced with continuous monitoring of child labour, the Russian Federation is committed to strengthening global frameworks that protect vulnerable children. We also have been supporting projects aimed at strengthening skills development systems in partner countries, including development of sectoral approaches, improving professional training quality and relevance, activities on anticipating future skills needs etc. Since 2013 "THE PROGRAMME TO STRENGTHEN THE SYSTEM OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION AND COLLABORATION In the development of employment in the CIS (Commonwealth of Independent States) Asia and The MIDDLE EAST has supported development of methods and foresight technology for predicting and evaluating future competency requirements in the hi-tech/fast-paced sectors of the pilot countries economies created a combination platform for leaders of professional education systems, facilitated exchange of the best practices between international experts and employers aimed at defining the key problems of training of managers of professional education systems in the pilot countries and self-diagnostic instruments in primary and secondary professional education institutions.
