The increasing density of our urban centers presents serious tests regarding environmental protection, resource management, and infrastructure resilience. Australia believes that the path to sustainable development lies in viewing urbanization not merely as an infrastructure issue, but as a holistic humanitarian matter affecting the well-being of future generations.

The global community is currently facing an unprecedented crisis where uncontrolled urbanization, environmental pollution, traffic congestion, and unregulated resource consumption threaten to render cities uninhabitable. This trajectory poses a grave threat to the shared future of humanity and the planet. Within the scope of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, particularly in accordance with SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities), Australia acknowledges the efforts made in the past. The challenge is not solely technological; it is deeply human. Global temperature rise and the deterioration of urban air quality are direct consequences of past urban planning models that prioritized consumption over sustainability. Furthermore, Australia utilizes digital data to rigorously monitor urban performance and create evidence-based plans. We invite the Committee to adopt a human-centric approach that questions not just "how" technology is used, but "why" it is used. We call for international cooperation to build cities that protect human dignity and secure our common future.
