Topic: Recognition and Visibility of Transgender Women



Unfortunately, when we look at the history of the world, it has become an important problem for the world that ignores trans women's rights, only because of their sexual orientation, ignore trans women, find no solutions to visibility problems, lack education, health, the right to choose and be elected, and people do not act according to the idea that trans women are also women. In some countries, in particular, the prohibition of homosexuality and even the murder and imprisonment of trans women prevent gay people from expressing their views. Trans women who cannot express their opinions and whose freedoms are restricted are forced to receive psychological support. As Poland, we are fully aware of the occupation of the rights of Trans women and we are always ready to support them.

In 1932, the rights of transgender and all other LGBT members became law in Poland. In Poland, same-sex sexual relationships, it is legal for both men and women, heterosexuals and homosexuals in Poland for both same-sexage of consent (15) was applied, and gay and bisexual men are allowed to donate blood, homosexuals and bisexuals in the military service are permitted for the identities of the Polish Armed Forces, clearly, also in 2018, the Polish Supreme Court decided that discrimination based on sexual orientation is illegal in the provision of goods and services has.

Anna Grodzka is a Polish politician. Grodzka, a trans woman, was elected to the Sejm in the 2011 Polish parliamentary elections as a candidate for the left-liberal Palikot's Movement, and was the first openly transgender Member of Parliament in Poland. In addition, Anna Grodzka spoke about Robert Biedron, who is expected to be Poland's first MP to be openly homosexual. "Today, Poland is changing. Robert Biedron and I are proof of that," she said.

As Poland, we are aware of the difficulties and troubles experienced by transgender people both in the world and in Poland. As Poland, we believe that no matter how big these problems are, UN delegates can best defend the rights of trans women together. We hope and wish that every citizen is treated equally around the world. As Poland delegates, we also have solutions to defend women's rights around the world.

1- Solution: An organization can be established where transgender people can go when they feel bad or think that their rights should be defended. This organization includes people who work voluntarily.
