

Country: Afghanistan Committee: WHO Agenda Item: New Formal After the COVID 19 Pandemic and the Role of Vaccinations

As a member of the State, Afghanistan works as part of the United Nations System (SNU), with a team that assumes the responsibility and coordination of activities carried out in the name of the system. The country whose official name is the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan. The capital of Afghanistan, a country in Asia that does not have a border with the sea, is Kabul, the largest city in the country. Located in Central Asia, the country is considered by some sources to be in the Middle East due to its ethnic and cultural ties. It is surrounded by Pakistan to the east and south, Iran to the west, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Tajikistan to the north.

According to the latest data for March there have been infections and coronavirus-related deaths reported in the country since the pandemic began. Afghanistan has administered at least 5,751,015 doses of COVID vaccines so far. Assuming every person needs 2 doses, that's enough to have vaccinated about 7.6% of the country's population. During the last week reported. Afghanistan averaged about 9,670 doses administered each day. At that rate, it will take a further 787 days to administer enough doses for another 10% of the population.

There are many anti-vaccine people in Afghanistan, so in order to protect the health of the Afghan people, trainings should be given and the public should be convinced to raise their awareness and gain their trust. Urgent support should be provided for the protection of the health of women and girls and access to hygiene supplies. Food support should be provided to reduce child deaths caused by hunger problems. Clean, healthy and adequate water sources should be created. People are also having trouble accessing medicines and hygiene supplies after the pandemic. Therefore, we need to work together to solve these problems and share the responsibility.
